**CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby called the meeting to order.

**INVOCATION:** Pastor Ron Burgett gave the invocation.

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**ADOPT AGENDA**: Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby asked for a motion to adopt the agenda.

Joe Wesson made a motion, and Jeff Wilson seconded, to adopt the agenda. All were in favor.

**APPROVE AUGUST 19, 2014 REGULAR MEETING MINUTES:** Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby asked for a motion to approve the August 19, 2014 regular meeting minutes.

Joe Wesson made a motion, and Johnny Wilson seconded, to approve the minutes. All were in favor.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby asked if anyone had any questions or comments at this time.

No one wished to speak.

#### **RECOGNITIONS:**

**RECYCLE REWARDS WINNER:** Town Administrator Seth Eckard announced Mr. and Mrs. Mark Maheux as the September Recycle Rewards winner. A credit of twenty-eight dollars (\$28.00) will be added to their sanitation bill and their certificate will be available at the Town Hall for pick up.

No Council action was required.

YARD OF THE MONTH WINNERS: Town Administrator Seth Eckard announced that Joe Helton, from the 28630 zip code, and IBS, from the 28638 zip code, as the September Yard of the Month winners. Town Administrator Seth Eckard stated that both certificates would be available at the Town Hall for pick up.

No Council action was required.

#### DISCUSSION:

**APPOINTMENT OF A NEW MAYOR:** On August 25, 2014, Bob Gibbs resigned as Mayor of Sawmills. Town Attorney Terry Taylor gave the council three (3) options as to what Council can do regarding the open Mayor seat. Those options up for discussion are:

- Nominate a candidate for Mayor;
- Postpone Mayor appointment; or
- Not appoint a Mayor and wait until the November 2015 election cycle.

Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby asked who wanted to start the discussion and Joe Wesson went first.

Joe Wesson stated that he has discussed this with Council and Sawmills' residents and he would like Sawmills' residents to be able to elect a Mayor in November 2015 and members of the Council can take on more responsibilities until the election.

Town Administrator Seth Eckard stated that instead of a four (4) year term, the person elected during the November 2015 election will only serve a two (2) year term and then run in the November 2017 election to get the Mayor seat back on the correct year.

Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby stated that if it is not going to be a hardship on the Town, then she agrees that members of the Council can take on more responsibility and let Sawmills' residents elect a Mayor in the November 2015 election.

Jeff Wilson stated that Sawmills' residents should be able to elect a Mayor in the November 2015 election.

Johnny Wilson stated that Council should wait until the November 2015 election and let the Sawmills' residents elect a Mayor unless a Mayor is needed before the election and then Council can appoint someone to act as Mayor until the election.

CALDWELL COUNTY RAILROAD COMMISSION MEMBER APPOINTMENT: A representative from each municipality serves a two (2) year term on the Caldwell County Railroad Commission. The two (2) year term started on January 1, 2014 and lasts until December 31, 2016. Bob Gibbs was serving on Caldwell County Railroad Commission representing the Town of Sawmills.

Jeff Wilson made a motion, Trena McRary Kirby seconded, that Joe Wesson will serve on the Caldwell County Railroad Commission representing the Town of Sawmills to finish out the two (2) year term. All were in favor. CALDWELL COUNTY SALES TAX REINVESTMENT COMMISSION MEMBER: Bob Gibbs was serving on the Caldwell County Sales Tax Reinvestment Commission representing the Town of Sawmills for a term that ends in December 2015.

Jeff Wilson made a motion, Joe Wesson seconded, that Johnny Wilson will serve on the Caldwell County Sales Tax Reinvestment Commission representing the Town of Sawmills to finish out the term. All were in favor.

#### PLANNING MATTERS:

**PROPOSED TEXT AMENDMENT FOR PROTEST PETITIONS:** Town Planner Elinor Hiltz stated that the protest petition section of the Town of Sawmills code conflicts with State Statutes. The proposed new text is the State Statute, almost verbatim:

If opposition to a rezoning turns in a valid protest petition more than two (2) working days before the public hearing, the Council must approve the rezoning by a three-fourths (3/4) vote for the rezoning to pass.

Town Planner Elinor Hiltz stated that Councils usually vote unanimously, so a statewide poll has shown that protest petitions have only affected the outcomes of approximately six percent (6%) of rezoning cases (the source of this information came from the UNC School of Government blog). Protest petitions are good for indicting that there is clear opposition to the rezoning.

Town Planner Elinor Hiltz also stated that if the Town of Sawmills did not have a protest petition in the ordinance, a landowner would have the right to file a protest petition per State law.

Town Planner Elinor Hiltz stated that the Comprehensive Plan does not cover rezoning proceedings. This text amendment could prevent legal challenges. The Planning Board unanimously recommended approval of this ordinance on September 2, 2014.

Jeff Wilson made a motion, Johnny Wilson seconded, to call for the Public Hearing on October 21, 2014, to adopt the proposed protest petition text amendment proposal for the Sawmills Code of Ordinances. All were in favor.

APPOINTMENT FOR SUBDIVISION REVIEW BOARD: Town Planner Elinor Hiltz stated that minor subdivisions and family subdivisions need to be reviewed by a small subcommittee called the Subdivision Review Board (SRB). The SRB is made up of the Mayor, the Planning Board Chairman, a member of the Planning Board, and an alternate member of the Planning Board. The SRB will meet on Tuesdays at 5:00 pm, or 5:30 pm, when there is a plat to review.

On September 2, 2014, the Planning Board appointed David Powell as the primary member and Clyde Miller as the alternate member for the SRB.

No Council action was required.

**PUBLIC COMMENT:** Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby asked if anyone had any questions or comments at this time.

Dan Kuehnert wanted to introduce himself to Council. Mr. Kuehnert is a resident of Burke County and is running for Superior Court Judge in the 25A Judicial District. Mr. Kuehnert is the Town Attorney for Glen Alpine, and is the former Town Attorney for Rutherford College, so he knows about local government.

#### **UPDATES:**

**CODE ENFORCEMENT MONTHLY REPORT:** Administrator Seth Eckard stated Town Planner Elinor Hiltz has enclosed an updated status report of Code Enforcement cases and the progress that has been made on each case as of September 2014.

No Council action was required.

**ADMINISTRATORS REPORT:** Town Administrator Seth Eckard made the following announcements:

- The Fall Festival was the biggest and best festival to date. We had 52 vendors.
- The Festival Committee will meet Wednesday, September 17, 2014, at 3:00 pm to discuss the Fall Festival and the upcoming Veterans' Day celebration.
- The bid opening for the slope project at Veterans Park will open on September 23, 2014.
- Town Administrator Seth Eckard and Mayor Pro-Tem Trena McRary Kirby will be going to the COG meeting on September 23, 2014, at 6:00 pm.
- The Veterans Park restrooms should be delivered on October 6, 2014, and should be ready for use by our Veterans' Day celebration. Public Works is hoping to have the sidewalk finished and some landscaping done around the restrooms by the Veterans' Day celebration but are not sure if they can get it all finished by then.
- The Town is going to try to open bids for the Duff Drive sewer project in December.

#### PROTEST PETITION TEXT AMENDMENT PROPOSAL

Deletions are in strikethrough; the new text is not in strikethrough

#### § 153.211 PROTEST PETITION.

- (A) General. A protest petition may be presented against any proposed amendment signed by the owners of 20% or more either of the area of the lots included in the proposed changes, or of those immediately adjacent thereto either in the rear thereof or on either side thereof, extending 100 feet there from, or of those directly opposite thereto extending 100 feet from the street fronting on the opposite lots. In this case the amendment shall not become effective except by favorable vote of three fourths of all members of the Town Council.
- (B) Petition requirements. No protest against any change in or amendment to the Zoning Code or Zoning Map shall be valid or effective unless it be in the form of a written petition actually bearing the signatures of the requisite number of property owners and stating that the signers do protest the proposed change or amendment, unless it shall have been received by the Town Clerk in sufficient time to allow the town at least two normal working days, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays, before the date established for a public hearing on the proposed change or amendment to determine the sufficiency and accuracy of the petition (G.S. §160A-387). (Ord. passed 4-17-2012)
- (A) A protest petition may be filed to contest a rezoning or zoning ordinance amendment. In case of a qualified protest against a zoning map amendment, that amendment shall not become effective except by favorable vote of three-fourths of all the members of the city council. For the purposes of this subsection, vacant positions on the council and members who are excused from voting shall not be considered "members of the council" for calculation of the requisite supermajority. No protest petition shall be valid unless it be in the form of a written petition actually bearing the signatures of the requisite number of property owners and stating that the signers do protest the proposed change or amendment, and unless it shall have been received by the town clerk in sufficient time to allow the town at least two normal work days, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays, before the date established for a public hearing on the proposed change or amendment to determine the sufficiency and accuracy of the petition. A person who has signed a protest petition may withdraw his or her name from the petition at any time prior to the vote on the proposed zoning amendment. Only those protest petitions that meet the qualifying standards at the time of the vote on the zoning amendment shall trigger the supermajority voting requirement.
- (B) To qualify as a valid protest petition, the petition must be signed by the owners of either (i) twenty percent (20%) or more of the area included in the proposed change or (ii) five percent (5%) of a 100-foot-wide buffer extending along the entire boundary of each discrete or separate area proposed to be rezoned. A street right-of-way shall not be considered in computing the 100-foot buffer area as long as that street right-of-way is 100 feet wide or less. When less than an entire parcel of land is subject to the proposed zoning map amendment, the 100-foot buffer shall be measured from the property line of that parcel. In the absence of evidence to the contrary, the city may rely on the county tax listing to determine the "owners" of potentially qualifying areas.
  - (C) The foregoing provisions concerning protests shall not be applicable to any amendment which

initially zones property added to the territorial coverage of the ordinance as a result of annexation or otherwise, or to an amendment to an adopted (i) special use district, (ii) conditional use district, or (iii) conditional district if the amendment does not change the types of uses that are permitted within the district or increase the approved density for residential development, or increase the total approved size of nonresidential development, or reduce the size of any buffers or screening approved for the special use district, conditional use district, or conditional district.


#### PLANNER'S STAFF REPORT

#### PROTEST PETITION TEXT AMENDMENT PROPOSAL

**Status:** The Planning Board unanimously recommended approval of this ordinance on September 2<sup>nd</sup>. The Call for Public Hearing was September 16<sup>th</sup>.

**Proposal:** The protest petition section of the Sawmills code conflicts with state statutes. The proposed new text is the state statute, almost verbatim.

If opposition to a rezoning turns in a valid protest petition more than two working days before the public hearing, then Council must approve the rezoning by a <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> vote for the rezoning to pass. Councils usually vote unanimously so a statewide poll has shown that protest petitions have only affected the outcomes of something like 6 percent of cases (UNC School of Government blog). But protest petitions are good for indicating that there is clear opposition to the rezoning.



The graphic above shows how many signatures a valid protest petition has to have.

The light gray area is the area to be rezoned. 20 percent of owners within the area to be rezoned must sign the protest petition. (Normally Sawmills does not do rezoning without the property owners' permission, but "administrative zonings" happen sometimes.)

The dark gray area represents a 100 foot buffer around the area to be rezoned. If owners holding at least 5 percent of the land in the dark gray area sign the protest petition, then the protest petition is valid. In many cases it is not hard to collect enough signatures for the protest petition to be valid-just one or two families usually.

If Sawmills did not have the protest petition in its ordinance, a landowner would still have a right to file one per state law. Right now we are just trying to make our local ordinance match state law.

#### Consistency with Comprehensive Plan:

Sawmills Comprehensive Plan does not cover rezoning proceedings, but zoning is a useful tool for land-use planning. This text amendment could prevent legal challenges. A judge can make a Town rehear a rezoning case if the Town did not do it legally the first time by inadvertently discounting a protest petition that should have been counted.

#### **Action Needed:**

#### 1)ADOPT STATEMENT

"Changing the protest petition section of the zoning ordinance protects property owner rights, but also allows a rezoning to pass if the rezoning is for the greater good. We are changing this section to adhere to state law."

**2)APPROVE THE TEXT AMENDMENT** "because it is not inconsistent with the Sawmills Comprehensive Plan".

#### Discussion:

Mrs. Teresa Berry initiated the process for a speed hump on Mayfield Dr.

Mrs. Berry did everything required by the Town's speed hump policy including obtaining 18 (eighteen) signatures, out of 19 (nineteen), that were needed for the petition within the 60 (sixty) days allotted.

Attached is a map that Todd Poteet, from West Consultants, and Ronnie Coffey determined the best location for the speed hump would be. Todd Poteet informed staff that Mayfield Dr meets the general criteria for a speed hump, except for the following:

Item 5: The minimum street length of 1,200 feet is not met. The street is only 960 feet long.

Item 6: It doesn't appear this street will meet the traffic volume of 400 vehicles per day.

#### Recommendation:

Staff recommends Council decide if they wish to install a speed hump on Mayfield Dr. based on the information provided.

SUBJECT: New Approval Procedures

I have just returned from the statewide planning conference where I learned one additional step the Town has to do to make rezonings and text amendments more legal.

It seems like we just learned about "consistency with the Comprehensive Plan". Now, in addition to making a "consistency statement" we also should adopt a "statement of reasonableness".

From now on staff reports will have two requested actions.

#### 1) ADOPT A STATEMENT

about the amendment harming or not harming the public good. The statement has to be unique to each case, because recently a judge turned down a City of Charlotte rezoning that said "the action is good for public health, safety, and welfare" because it was not specific enough. So every case, I will put suggested "statement of reasonableness" in the bottom of the staff report, in a box. The statement will need to be adopted.

#### 2) REZONE OR AMEND THE ORDINANCE

and in the motion please state that the action will be "consistent (or inconsistent) with the Comprehensive Plan". A suggested motion will be in a box at the bottom of the staff report as well.

Seth and I have tried to make it easy on the Council by providing the language and Seth invented the box. Sorry for the inconvenience of adding another step! Hopefully it will go smoothly after a couple of tries.
